#### Dear Friends in Christ:



### HISTORY OF ST. PETER'S EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN CHURCH FORESTVILLE. WISCONSIN

Isaiah 55:11 "So shall my word be that goeth forth out of my mouth: it shall not return unto me void, but it shall accomplish that which I please, and it shall prosper in the thing whereunto I sent it."

How evident these words of the Lord are in the past century of St. Peter's history: Records indicate that since 1875, 2310 persons were received into communion with the Triune God, when their sins were washed away and at the font they were baptized in the Name of God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Ghost. 1051 with their own lips renewed that baptismal vow. publicly confessed their faith in the rite of confirmation and thus were received into communicant membership by St. Peter's Lutheran Congregation. 115 marriages were sanctified before the altar, while 571 received Christian burial.

Although this year we are observing our Centennial, the beginning of this congregation must be dated back farther than 100 years. As early as 1863 the first settlers in this vicinity were ministered unto with the Word of God by Pastor Brockmann of Wolf River, now Algoma. From 1867 to 1875 Pastors Keller and Zimmerman of Town Rankin had charge of ministering to the Lutherans of this area.

In 1875 little St. Peter's congregation, together with Emmanuel across the river extended a "Call" to the Rev. August G. Doehler to become their first pastor. He entered upon his duties in the Fall of that year. At that time the congregation numbered about 125 souls. Old records show that some of the early members contributed as high as \$12.00 a year, surely a generous sum in those days when money was scarce.

In 1877 the congregation applied for and was received into membership with the Synod of Missouri, Ohio, Wisconsin and other States, thus St. Peter's is one of the older members of that church body in the now North Wisconsin District of the Lutheran Church - Missouri Synod.

After 14 years of faithful service, Paster Doehler was called to another field. Pastor August Luebkemann became his successor; he likewise served St. Peter's for the same length of time — 14 years. During the years of his ministry, in 1891, the old edifice was replaced with a new house of worship at a cost of \$4,000. In 1892 St. Peter's congregation and Emmanuel, across the river severed relations, with Emmanuel now becoming affiliated with St. Paul's of Algoma, while St. Peter's became an independent congregation.

When in the fall of 1903, Pastor Luebkemann accepted a call to Batavia, Wisconsin, the congregation extended a

call to Pastor G. H. Berger of Rily, Michigan. Rev. Berger was installed here on the 22nd of November.

The old parsonage, having long ago passed the days of its youth and beauty was sold for \$100. A new home for the spiritual overseer of the congregation was erected in 1904. The cost of the new parsonage was about \$2,700. The fact that the members liberally donated labor and part of the material made it possible to erect this roomy and substantial dwelling at a comparatively low cost. Recently renovated, the parsonage serves comfortably to this day.

In the course of time the old schoolhouse, which had formerly served as a church, became rather delapidated and in 1912 it was replaced by a new one on a lot just west of the parsonage, purchased at the price of \$500, the building itself costing about \$1,800.

For 38 years, up to 1913, the pastors of the congregation had also taught in the Christian Day school. trying to do the work of two men. It was evident, however, that one iman could not fill two offices at the same time without neglecting one or the other. It was therefore a step in the right direction when the congregation engaged a teacher for the school. The first teacher for St. Peter's School was Miss Mathilda Heins of Webster City, Iowa.


After years of steady growth the congregation suffered a decline during and immediately after World War I, as high land prices tempted a number of members to sell their land and move elsewhere. Many of our young people also went to seek employment in larger cities, thus causing a constant drain on the membership of our church. At the end of fifty years of existence, St. Peter's had a membership of 426 souls with 295 communicant members. The Ladies Aid consisted of 49 members and the Walther League 44.

In 1925 Pastor Berger accepted a Call to Neshkoro, Wisconsin, so that when the congregation celebrated its 50th Anniversary on September 20, 1925, they were without the services of a resident pastor.

At a duly called meeting on December 23, 1925, St. Peter's Congregation extended a call to The Rev. Rudolph Stuth of Town Richmond, Shawano County. He accepted and was installed here on January 31, 1926, by Pastor Walter Braem.

On October 6th, 1940, the congregation celebrated its 65th Anniversary with three services in which the Rev. Diab. Merrill, Wisconsin; Professor J. Berger, St. Paul, Minnesota; and Rev. Gust Krueger, Marshfield, Wisconsin, delivered the festival messages.

In 1947 Pastor Stuth received a call from St. John's

Congregation, Wisconsin Rapids. He requested a peaceful release and was granted the same. His farewell sermon was delivered a few weeks later on October 5, 1947. During the succeeding vacancy the congregation was served by The Rev. T. A. Baganz of Sturgeon Bay.

A call was extended to the Rev. Otto T. Zeeb of Glenwood Springs, Colorado, whose vicarage assignment had been supervised by Rev. Baganz. Pastor Zeeb accepted and was installed on Sunday, January 25, 1948.

In a special meeting held on June 7, 1948, the congregation voted to tear down the old church building and to proceed at once with the construction of a new house of worship. Plans were made already during Pastor Stuth's pastorate to replace the old church. On the following Sunday, June 13, the pastor delivered the last sermon in the old church building. The next day members began the work of dismantling. An average of 40 members came each day and in five days the church was completely dismantled.

Construction was begun on the new building during the summer of 1948, and plans were to have it completed by Thanksgiving. However, shortages of cement and steel hampered construction. The cornerstone was laid on October 24th, 1948, with Prof. J. Berger of Concordia, St. Paul, serving as the guest speaker.


On December 24, 1948, the congregation assembled in the basement of the new church for the first time, when the children of the congregation presented their Chrismas program.

In August of 1949, Pastor Zeeb accepted a Call extended to him by Grace Lutheran Church, Austin, Texas. He delivered his farewell sermon on August 28. The Rev. E. A. Wians served as interim pastor from September until December 18, 1949, when the Rev. Wm. G. Brockopp of Glidden, Wisconsin, was installed as the Chief Shepherd of St. Peter's.

St. Peter's Congregation was without the services of a regular pastor when the present House of Worship was dedicated on Sunday, December 11, 1949. However, under the faithful guidance of Vacancy Pastor, Rev. E. A. Wians of St. John's, Rakin, the congregation rejoiced in two festival services. Guest speaker for the morning service was a former pastor, the Rev. Rudolph Stuth of Wisconsin Rapids, while Rev. Wm. Kohn, President of the North Wisconsin District of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod was the speaker for the afternoon service. The following Sunday, December 18, 1949, the Rev. W. G. Brockopp was installed as pastor of St. Peter's.

In 1950 new sidewalks were laid around the church, the church grounds were covered with topsoil and seeded, a new tile floor was laid in the basement of the church and St. Peter's celebrated its 75th Anniversary on October 8. Guest Speaker for the morning service was the Rev. Paul Schedler of Wayside and the Rev. Herbert Baxman of Plymouth delivered the message for the p. m. service.

On April 17, 1955, the Rev. Wm. G. Brockopp announced that he had accepted a Call extended to him by Zion

Lutheran Church of Neshkoro, Wisconsin. He delivered his farewell sermon on Sunday, May 29.

Five months later, almost to the day, the Lord of the Church again provided St. Peter's with a Shepherd when the Rev. Carl Ehrfurth of New Britain, Conn., was installed by Rev. Paul Schedler in a 7:30 p. m. service, September 18, 1955. During Rev. Ehrfurth's pastorate numerous improvements were made including the blacktopping of the parking lot, and the erection of an outdoor bulletin board. The mortgage on the edifice was paid off in 1959, just 10 years after the dedication of the new church building. A mortgage burning ceremony took place on Sunday, December 27, 1959.

St. Peter's experienced in September of 1962, another vacancy when Pastor Carl P. Ehrfurth accepted a call to Bear Creek, Wisconsin. The congregation requested that Pastor Theodore Hilgendorf of St. John's, Luxemburg, serve as their Spiritual Overseer during the vacancy.

Pastor E. H. Gade of Gleason, Wisconsin, became the next pastor of St. Peter's in the Fall of 1962. During Rev. Gade's tenure the school was discontinued at the end of the 1962-1963 term; \$8,500 was designated to extensively remodel the first floor of the parsonage, the kitchen was renovated, new thermopane windows were installed downstairs, and several rooms were paneled.

At the January 23, 1967 Annual Meeting, the congregation voted to sell the Christian Day school building to the Village of Forestville for \$3,500. On the July 16 meeting, the congregation voted to build a new entrance to the church at a cost of \$50,000. The new addition to the church was dedicated on Sunday, January 26, 1969. Rev. Lloyd Goetz, President of the North Wisconsin District of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, was the morning guest, while the Rev. Leonard P. Buelow, pastor of Redeemer

Lutheran Church and Circuit Counselor, Green Bay, was the afternoon speaker.

At a special meeting on August 3, 1970, Pastor E. H. Gade was given a peaceful release so that he could accept a Call issued by St. Paul's Lutheran Church. Hackensack, and Emmanuel Lutheran Church. Backus. Minnesota. The congregation engaged the Rev. Ralph Danielsen of St. John's, Rankin, to serve during the interim.

After numerous calls had been extended, the Rev. Clarence Cizek of Faith Lutheran Church, Chippewa Falls, Wisconsin, became pastor of St. Peter's, He was installed on Sunday, May 9, 1971 at 7:30 p. m.

During Pastor Cizek's pastorate numerous improvements took place. The congregation completed remodeling the parsonage, new hymnals were purchased, summer services were conducted at the local Jellystone Park, and a new mission congregation was begun at Sturgeon Bay. The Church sacristy was remodeled and a new pipe organ was purchased as a 100th Anniversary project. Pastor C. J. Cizek was given his release on December 2, 1974, when he announced his decision to accept a call extended to him by Mount Olive Lutheran Church, Scofield, Wisconsin; Pastor Cizek delivered his farewell sermon on January 26, 1975.

Pastor Ralph N. Danielsen of St. John's, Rankin, was again called on to serve the congregation as vacancy pastor. At the Annual Meeting of the congregation on January 13, 1975, the voter's assembly unanimously voted to extend a call to Rev. Alfred Zutz, of New Rockford, North Dakota After a short vacancy of only a month, Pastor Zutz was installed as the new pastor of St. Peter's on Sunday, March 2, 1975, Rev. Leonard P. Buelow, First Vice-President of the North Wisconsin District of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod delivered the sermon and officiated in the rite of installation. Pastor Buelow chose as his text: Galatians 6:14 "Glory In The Cross Of Christ". Rev. Ralph Danielsen, Vacancy Pastor and Circuit Counselor served as liturgist.

.During the past 100 years, St. Peter's congregation has

sent six young men into the ministry of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod. We pray that this number will be greatly increased in the next century as we hear that day of our Lord's second coming. Young men who entered the ministry were: Frank Zirbel. Gustav Krueger. John Fisher. Allen Moore, Elroy Brockopp and Edward Gade. Several young people. Delbert Mueller and Eunice Gade, entered the teaching ministry of our Church.

As we look back across a century one thing has been a thorn in the side of St. Peter's to hinder our growth. From its very inception large numbers of baptized and confirmed young people tolder members also; have left the area to seek education and employment in larger metropolitan areas, causing a constant drain on our membership.

Yet, we can thank Almighty God for giving us the opportunity to build our young people upon Christ and His Word the one solid foundation, so they can serve as useful servants in His Kingdom wherever their career or employment takes them. In spite of the great influx of young people leaving our area, the Lord has seen fit to bless His Word, that in spite of the difficulties of a rural congregation, St. Peter's has continued to grow.

Today, at the end of 100 years St. Peter's congregation numbers 518 baptized members and 374 communicant members. Of these 36 are serving their Lord through the Ladies Aid; 26 are members of the LWML; 20 belong to the Walther League and 15 are members of our Men's Club.

As we, the members of St. Peter's move into the next century, our goal will still be the same — namely, to proclaim a changeless Christ to a changing world.

### St. Peter's Ladies Aid

St. Peter's Ladies Aid was organized in the year 1909. By 1925 its membership totaled about 40 members. Only one of this first group of ladies to join is still a member of our present Ladies Aid, Mrs. Pertha Leege.

In the first years the meetings were held in the Lutheran School, classes being dismissed earlier than usual. Finally finding this too inconvenient, the Ladies of the Aid decided to hold their meetings in each of the members' homes. This method continued until January of 1950 when our new church was completed with a large basement and kitchen.

Our present membership is thirty-six. We have a mission project plus doing many things to improve our parsonage and church. Over the years such things as redecorating the parsonage, buying carpeting, new hymnals, baptismal font, the organ we are using at the present time, communion ware and many, many other items too numerous to mention were bought by the Aid. About a year ago our kitchen was remodeled, the greater debt being paid by our Aid.

Our activities consist of bazaars, luncheons and other social activities.

We meet the first Thursday of every month. Certainly the one afternoon we spend with our fellow Christians is very worth while as we meditate on God's Word and grow in love toward each other and to our Savior who died for us.

## Lutheran Women's Missionary League

The L. W. M. L. was organized in 1961 under Rev. Ehrfurth. The purpose of the organization is to further the work of gaining new souls for Christ by working on special mission projects in addition to the synod's regular programs. In 1962 the organization grew to 32 members.

Quarterly meetings are held which include Bible study, business meeting, and the collection of the mile boxes. Contributions to the special mission projects which have been chosen at the L. W. M. L. convention are made through the mile boxes and offerings given at each Zone rally. The purpose of the rally is to inform, educate and inspire the members to carry out the Savior's command.

At present the L. W. M. L. has 26 members. The officers are Jeanette Uecker, president; Verna Gebauer, vice-president; Inez Mueller, secretary-treasurer.

#### St. Peter's Walther League

St. Peter's Waither League meets at least once a month for study of God's Word and Christian fellowship. It is an auxiliary through which confirmed youth can serve their Lord and their church.

In 1907 the Walther League purchased the gas lights for the old church; in 1916 new hymnboards were provided, as well as again in 1949. The latter hymnboards and numerals serve St. Peter's to this day. Reserved pew signs were furnished in 1951.

When the membership began to dwindle in the late 1960's, Pastor Gade urged Bob and Nila Schley to assist him as counselors. With the Lord's help activity and membership increased. In 1967 the W. L. donated \$100 to The Lutheran Children's Friend Society, receiving the

Good Samaritan Award. In 1968 and 1969 the like amount was contributed to Bethesda Lutheran Home and Dakota Boy's Ranch. In 1972 a stereo was donated to St. Peter's.


Members of the Walther League annually trim the Christmas tree and set up the horn of plenty at Thanksgiving; the young men also serve as ushers for the regular Worship services.

Under the direction of Pastor Cizek, the Walther League became the first organization of St. Peter's to serve an Easter breakfast.





#### MEN'S CLUB





Present officers are: Sylvester Jome, President; Jerry Uecker, Sec., and Orville Buechner, Treas.




